



ADJUVANT THERAPIES **IN MELANOMA**

A guide to navigate treatment options



Dive into the basics

What is Stage IIB or IIC melanoma?

In stage II, the cancer has not spread to nearby lymph nodes or to distant sites. Stage II is divided into three levels IIA, IIB, and IIC. Stage IIB and IIC melanoma is at a greater risk of recurring based on the depth of the melanoma and/or the presence of ulceration on the pathology report.

What is Stage III melanoma?

Stage III melanoma has spread to the lymph nodes. Stage III can be divided into 4 categories based on the evolution of the tumour and the extent of the spread to the lymph nodes. These categories are classified as A, B, C and D. These 4 categories are used to determine prognosis and treatment of the melanoma.


What is primary treatment for Stage IIB, IIC, III melanoma?

Surgery will likely be recommended once diagnosis is confirmed. The goal of surgery is to remove the cancer and the affected lymph nodes to minimize the risk of the cancer returning.

What is the genetic mutation of the tumour?

The tissue that was removed during surgery will be tested for specific gene mutations. Certain mutations can alter a gene. For example, approximately half of all melanomas have a mutation in the BRAF gene. Identifying associated gene mutations can help determine if additional treatment options such as targeted therapies are recommended.

Once you know the stage of the melanoma, you can discuss next steps of care with your health care professional.



Navigating treatment options

What is adjuvant therapy?

Patients who have had surgery to remove stage IIB, IIC or III melanoma with no evidence of visible disease could still have a recurrence as a result of undetectable microscopic spread. Adjuvant therapy is additional systemic treatment used after surgery to remove any microscopic cancer cells and reduce the chance of the cancer returning.

What types of adjuvant therapies are available after surgery?

Observation

Observation with scheduled follow-up testing and imaging surveillance can be used to watch for the cancer spreading or returning.

Systemic Treatment Options

Dabrafenib + Trametinib (brand name Tafinlar® + Mekinist®)

A pill combination that is swallowed to help prevent melanoma from returning in patients who have the BRAF mutation. Dabrafenib and Trametinib, respectively, inhibit the BRAF and MEK proteins. BRAF and MEK are key molecules that help regulate cell growth. Dabrafenib and Trametinib stops cancer cells from spreading.

Nivolumab (brand name Opdivo®)

A medicine that is given intravenously in the hospital or clinic to help delay or prevent melanoma from returning after the cancer has been removed. Nivolumab is an immune checkpoint inhibitor that targets PD-1, a protein on immune system cells (called T cells) that normally help keep these cells from attacking other cells in the body. Nivolumab blocks the PD-1 protein to help increase immune activity against melanoma. Opdivo, as monotherapy, is indicated for the adjuvant treatment of adult patients with Stage IIB, IIC or III melanoma following complete resection.

Pembrolizumab (brand name Keytruda®)

Medication that is given intravenously in the hospital or clinic to help prevent melanoma from returning. Pembrolizumab also blocks the PD-1 protein to help increase immune activity against melanoma. Pembrolizumab is indicated for the adjuvant treatment of adult and pediatric (12 years and older) patients with Stage IIB, IIC or III melanoma following complete resection.
